s we reflect on 2024, it is with immense pride and a deep sense of gratitude that I present this overview of the Faculty of Arts and Design at the Tshwane University of Technology. The past year has been one of renewed purpose, expansive creativity and deeply engaged scholarship. While we continue with the overarching theme of "Artivism," we embraced "Manufacturing Joy" as our focus for 2024. This allowed us to commit ourselves to creating spaces of optimism, healing and hope for our students, staff, and the communities we serve.

This theme was not merely aspirational. It became a lived ethos, shaping how we taught, collaborated, researched and performed. We understood that in an increasingly fractured world seized with all types of wars on the climate and on humanity, joy must be cultivated intentionally. It is an act of care, resistance, and renewal and as we drive creativity our Faculty embraced this fully, in both spirit and practice.

We were proud to welcome over **504** new students across our programmes, each bringing their own spark of curiosity, passion and creativity. With the dedication of our academic and professional teams, we achieved a **90**% student success rate which is an outstanding milestone that reflects our ongoing investment in student-centeredness, resulting in such academic excellence.

Among the many highlights of 2024, the **Inaugural Global Artivism Conference**, hosted at the CSIR International Convention Centre, stands out as a transformative moment for the faculty. The conference convened leading thinkers, creatives, activists and scholars from around the world, affirming our Faculty's position as a global thought leader in the intersection between creativity and social justice.

Equally vibrant was the **6th Annual TUT Arts Festival**, a celebration of student-led innovation across fashion, music, performance, visual arts and design. The festival reaffirmed the power of interdisciplinary collaboration and the creative energy that pulses through our Arts Campus. This festival is embedded in the academic programme and fulfils the curriculum imperative of experiential learning in the curriculum.

In March, the Research Niche Area, Addressing GBV through Artivism, hosted its first Gender-Based Violence Symposium, a

powerful, emotionally resonant gathering that combined academic reflection with artistic expression. This critical event has become a cornerstone of our engaged research practice.

The 2nd **Dean's Concert**, held on the iconic Opera stage at the South African State Theatre, was another high point. This extraordinary event showcased the world-class talents of our Department of Performing Arts and the strength of our artistic leadership. The concert echoed our shared belief in the transformative potential of music and the performing arts.

We also celebrated the international recognition of **Professor Karendra Devroop**, whose **Grammy nomination** was a historic first for our institution. His achievement underscores the excellence of our academic community and the global reach of our creative outputs.

The Faculty also collaborated with UNISA to present the spectacular **Bolly-Jazz Symphonic Encounter** at the ZK Mathews Hall , an ambitious cultural fusion of jazz, Indian classical music and orchestral arrangements that captivated audiences and demonstrated the boundless possibilities of intercultural collaboration.

On the research front, the Faculty has continued to thrive. We have seen a measurable increase in scholarly output, creative production and postgraduate research activity. Our staff are publishing and exhibiting nationally and internationally and our niche research areas are positioning us as leaders in practice-led, socially engaged inquiry.

Looking ahead to **2025**, our new Faculty focus, "AGENCY," calls us to deepen our work on empowerment, responsibility and action. It is a powerful continuation of the joy we manufactured in 2024, reminding us that joy without agency can be fleeting, while agency rooted in joy is sustainable and transformative.

In August 2025, our Research Niche Area, "Addressing GBV through Artivism," will host the **Second Annual GBV Symposium**, again on our very own Arts Campus that offers a vital space for reflection, collaboration and healing through creative practice. This important initiative will coincide with Women's Month, amplifying its urgency and impact.

We will also proudly host the **7th TUT Arts Festival**, building on its legacy as one of the most dynamic platforms for emerging artists

and designers in South Africa. The festival will continue to showcase interdisciplinary work that challenges convention and centres the voices of the next generation.

As we look even further toward **2026**, our focus will remain on deepening curriculum transformation, growing international partnerships, enhancing postgraduate education and investing in infrastructure that supports creativity, wellness and innovation. Our commitment to decolonial practice, gender equity and community-responsive research will remain the foundation of everything we do.

The Faculty of Arts and Design is not simply an academic space - it is a movement. It is where futures are imagined, identities are negotiated, injustices are challenged and beauty is crafted with care and purpose.

I wish to thank each staff member, student, alumni, partners and our wider community for the role you play in making this Faculty not just excellent, but necessary.



Towards a pedagogy of care


